The Board focused on the following areas in 2017:

- · Strategic planning
- · Marketing and branding
- · Community events

Chaired by Board member Nadja Cramer, the Strategic Planning committee began the year with a Staff and Board workshop designed to identify improvement opportunities for the school. The information gathered at that session plus further input gathered from parents and staff along the way has resulted in the 2018 to 2022 Quintilian Strategic Plan that appears later in this Annual Report. A number of components of the plan are in the process of being implemented whilst others elements will be rolled out over the lifetime of the plan.

I think that the photo banners on our new web site portray our school in a way that words alone can never quite achieve. Many thanks to long-time parent and former Council (as it was then) member Danni Booth for her time, expertise and patience in taking all those shots. More recently and going forwards you'll see a number of video testimonials on the web site that we believe are reflective of the strengths of our school.

Thanks are due to Deputy Chair Pepita Bulloch and Principal Neil Collins for their hard work in pulling the web site together along with our marketing consultant (and parent) Kaila Milne of Intersect Communications and web site designers Birdbrain (through parent David Metcalf).

One area where I believe we have really excelled this year is Community Events. Led by our Board Member Sue-anne Munckton and very ably supported by committee members Vona Smith, Carolyn Lilley and Rebecca Potts, this team has delivered on every event from the Welcome Back Party through to the Twilight Carols and Christmas Market.

The Rottnest Camp, Scitech, the Trivia and Games Night and 100 Days Breakfast events were also highlights for me, but the lower key "Freezing Fridays" might well have been preferred by our students?

There were many other staff and parent helpers involved in our events of course and I thank you all for your support. These events not only create a great camaraderie amongst our community, but they also raise a insignificant amount of money for our school.

With regards to Governance, our Board Charter has been completed this year, addressing topics including the role, structure, code of conduct and operation of the Board. Also, the WA Associations Incorporation Act 2015 necessitates further updates to our Constitution which will be tabled for your review and approval at the 2018 AGM.

Returning after the summer break I hope that you noticed the changes made to somewhat smarten up the Quintilian Road façade. This is my fourth annual report to the Quintilian School Community and I am surprised at how quickly the past few years have flown by. This year we worked hard to maintain stable enrolment numbers and through sound financial management, we were able to finish with a budget surplus. This is testament to the fine guidance by our Finance Sub-committee and our Accounts Department. Despite some stabilisation in our local economy, we still saw a number of our ex – pat families heading back home as their resource projects ended.

I am confident that we continue to offer an outstanding teaching and learning environment that is child-centred and built on the value of mutual respect between students, staff and parents. Our teaching and non-teaching staff go beyond expectations and it is obvious that working at Quintilian is far more than just a job, but rather a place where all our staff know what great lifelong impact they have on our children.

Our teachers seek to extend themselves and our students with stimulating and exciting lessons so that our students love to come to school. Of course our non-teaching staff are just as committed to providing superb support and a framework that allows our teachers to perform. Our students continue to gain fine results in NAPLAN and other external tests. These results are usually well in excess of State and National averages and many of our students are at the highest range of these standards.

Our whole school professional learning this past year has covered protective behaviours, gifted and talented education, first aid and resuscitation, seven steps writing program, futuristic learning and classrooms of the future. In addition, staff have been supported to attend a wide variety of individual professional learning opportunities.



The appointment of a Gifted and Talented Education Coordinator has led to an extension of GATE learning programs for our most talented students. Students have had the opportunity of participating in Tournament of the Minds, UWA extension program, Chess Club and a number of other activities. Our new association with Mensa has also provided further support and opportunities.

The school continues to seek feedback from parents, teachers and students through a variety of means. This feedback and our stable enrolments confirm that the school community is very highly satisfied with the educational program provided. Over 90% of new enrolments are recommended by either current or past parents and this speaks volumes for the Quintilian educational experience that our students receive.

This year in conjunction with Intersect Communications, we developed and launched our new website to very favourable reviews, as well as producing video testimonials, creating our social media pages on Facebook and Instagram. New signage was also installed at key points around the school to ensure our local community are aware of our location.

The Events Committee continues to have a great impact on the life of our school with their organisation of an amazing array of events. The Trivia Night, Christmas Carols evening and Scitech family night were all exceptional events with hundreds of people in attendance. The strong community support of these events says a great deal about the type of school we have. I offer my sincere thanks to the Events Committee for your tireless work with these activities

Other annual highlights include the very popular Rottnest Family Weekend Camp, our Welcome Party Sundowner, Mid – Week Munchies, Disco nights and the Early Learning Centre Gallery night.

I wish to thank the Strategic Planning Sub-committee of parents and staff who worked for many months to get this plan in place, which now guides the future direction of our school. A small group of committed teachers developed our new Social and Emotional Learning Framework for use across our school. This framework ties together our current practices with a number of new initiatives for the future.

Our extra-curricular clubs and activities program continues to offer new and exciting activities for our students to go with our regular offerings. This program includes activities such as tennis, soccer, floorball, netball, Kids N Sport, running club, robotics, making go karts, construction club, choir, drama club, tournament of minds to name a few. Our music tuition program continues to offer a wide range of learning experiences from violin, guitar, piano, drums to rock bands.

At the end of 2017, we sadly said farewell to a number of long-term employees who were either retiring or moving on to new adventures. Lisa Ryder, Liza Hender, Barbie Thomas, Dionne Saddik and Rod Durston all made a significant impact on the life of Quintilian School; and our staff, parents, current and past students will always remember them very fondly. I am sure their ties to Quintilian will remain strong.

I would like to thank all members of the Board for their many hours of tireless work in the governance of Quintilian School. We have a very professional Board with a wide range of skills who take their role very seriously and always act in the best interests of our school.

I have been fortunate to know and work with our Board Chair, Peter Robinson, for the past four years. Peter has spent ten years at Quintilian and for most of these years; he has been on our School Board with many as Chair. Following on from the successful Quintilian 40th birthday celebrations in 2016 the Board elected to formalise the Quintilian School Events Committee. An Events Committee Charter was developed over the summer holiday and a call for committee members made in early February. The Board also felt it important that a current Board Member, Chair the committee to ensure good communication between the Board and Events Committee and also giving the Committee the autonomy it needed. A teacher representative was also requested. Sue-anne Munckton accepted the role as Committee Chair, Rebecca Potts as the staff representative and Carolyn Lilley and Vona Smith as parent volunteers.

With a more formalised approach to meetings and processes the Committee set to work on an Events Proposal which was tabled and accepted in full by the School Board in March 2017. The main objectives for 2017 being:



- 1. The planning of quality community events that were specially addressing the ethos of the school. These events were to be both free and ticketed. The wider community as well as the school community were to be given as many varied opportunities to attend these events.
- 2. The re-introduction of fundraising events and activities focussing on specific items/ideas marketed to the community as such with set goals and strict monitoring. The committee was to conduct the fundraising and work towards 2 projects- the replacement of the current school kitchen fridge and freezer and development of the main school playground (new fort). It was noted that fundraising had been removed from the Class Reps responsibility two years ago and all fundraising was to be coordinated by the Events Committee.

The Events Committee also instigated the following in 2017:



Community Events for 2017:

- Feedback from the school community on events through post event feedback forms which saw
 a great return of comments and suggestions.
- Communication to the school through Class Reps and a roster system for events which proved successful throughout the year.
- A dedicated Events email address was established and used for all event communication for 2017.
- A clear delineation was made for expenses and costs between events and Year 6 Camp fundraising. The School Discos and Mid-Week Munchies are for the Year 6 Camp fundraising. Fundraising Events and Activities were conducted each term:
- Term 1 Mushroom Boxes.
- Term 2 Entertainment Books (commenced in Term 1).
- Term 3 Trivia and Games Night (also an adult only Event just for fun!).
- Term 4 50/50 Raffle- first prize \$5000.
- Freezing Fridays each Friday throughout the year.

Quintilian Welcome Back Party – Although the three days prior to this event saw the heaviest rains in Perth for 70 years a record crowd attended the Welcome Back Party for 2017. Spinning and bumping Zorb Balls, a bouncy castle, animal farm, side show games and a specific area for our littler friends made for a fun evening. Drinks and food were also available, and a great night was had by all.

Rottnest Family Camp — As always Rottnest tries to challenge us with some rainy weather. However, it did not deter over 100 extended families and staff from making the trip this year. There were some new activities such as a Friday Night Game of Putt Putt for families and a tour of the island by bus. The traditional Quokka Hunt was of course held with staff and Board Members this year taking on an Aussie Themed Dress Up and Challenge. Just as we thought the rain would defeat us the clouds parted and the sun shone, giving wayto a wonderful Saturday afternoon of fun and community. Sand castles were made all afternoon before many left to attend smaller BBQs and gatherings.

The selfie competition was again a great hit but this time with a slight twist as you needed to include the 'Q' in your pic. We also introduced a "Quintessential Quintilian" Photo Comp which were shown to the school at assembly upon our return. It was a great way to capture the essence of our weekend away together.

Scitech – Back by popular demand we again booked out Scitech for a Quintilian evening of fun. Nearly 200 students and their families attended this event where a bar was introduced for the first time to great feedback. This was a ticketed event where cold drinks and preordered food were also available.

100 Day Breakfast – From day one of the school year we started counting. Every 10 days a class was responsible for adding their 'number of 10' to the display board in the music hall. 100 days of school fell just after the start of Term 3 and a Pancake and Pls breakfast was held for students, families and staff. Over 300 breakfasts were served with many families taking advantage of a hot coffee and breakfast before heading off to work. The students were also able to have their faces painted with the number 100! A special assembly was then held to celebrate all the amazing things the school had done and places visited in 100 days. This was a free school community event and saw many parents (particularly Dads) take advantage of a breakfast and catch up before the day started.

Trivia and Games Night – Although initially planned as a fundraising event it soon become obvious that the Quintilian Parents love a dress up and totally took on a self-perpetuating competition to be the best themed table on the night. Games, puzzles, competitions and a few rounds of questions made for a fun night where knowledge and luck were put to the test. This event was held off the school grounds and proved to be well worth the effort to do so, with more people able to attend and a 'bigger' atmosphere created. The "Clowns Running the Show" were joined by rock stars (dead and alive), 80's prom kings and queens, trophy statues, many many Neil's and Rebecca's, President Trump, some scrabble tiles and gangsters- just to name a few. This was a ticketed event with food and drinks available. A silent auction was also held with over \$20,000 in prizes and donations received from the

Twilight Carols and Christmas Market – What a way to finish the Events Calendar for 2017!!!! Early in term 2 plans were well underway for the Market and Carols. A Christmas Club of Year 4 to 6's was established and run by the Events Committee. In addition, every class in the school

had their craft talents used and made contributions to the market stalls. Music Michelle and Michael Basham from On The Run Music worked on the songs for the night with the view to incorporate the work into already allocated music lessons. All the planning culminated in a wonderful night of

community and song. The market came close to selling out, hot food and cold drinks flowed, and voices raised the roof of the undercover area. All Quintilian students from pre-kindy to yr 6 took part. Additional performances were made by the School Choir, an especially developed Marimba and Xylophone Ensemble, a current and ex student band and special guests including a Christmas Fairy, Elf, Rudolph, Frosty and Santa all resulted in a wonderful evening and a perfect end to a fabulous year of events. This was a free event extended to the wider community.

At the end of the year taking into account all expenses for all events and costs incurred (incl. long term investment purchases of equipment) a figure of \$14,916 was raised.

Both the planned school kitchen fridge and freezer were purchased in 2017 and the School Playground Fort will be built in the holidays at the end of Term 1. Funds raised in 2017 have covered the costs of the fridge and freezer with a contribution made towards the school fort. Fundraising will continue into 2018 and beyond (as required) for the purpose of replacing the capital expenditure contribution to the fort. It was felt important that the current community benefit from these items if they were undertaking the fundraising and volunteer work towards the items.

Thank you to the Events Committee team and all who volunteered their time this year to help make the 2017 Events calendar such a success.

Early Learning Cluster - Mel Rayment

The Lower Clusters (Year 1-3) and ELC (PK - PP) joined forces to create the Early Learning Cluster (PK - Year 2) in 2017. Through a play-based program, we focus on developing the children's social, emotional, literacy and numeracy skills. Our teaching team work collaboratively, meeting formally once a fortnight and casually when needed to ensure there is consistency across the year groups.

We follow the Western Australian and Australian Curriculum and incorporate the Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF) outcomes. We always endeavour to program play-based activities and real life experiences that will consolidate, extend and enhance the children's understanding of the learning areas. The classes regularly attend incursions, excursions and a year group camp for Year 1 and 2, which is always a highlight.

As a cluster we feel it is important to provide opportunities for the parents and children to connect as a whole group. In Term 2 the Early Learning Cluster held a Gathering on the Green, allowing the parents, children and teachers, from across the year groups, to socialise together on a Friday afternoon. Mother's Day and Father's Day were the next two cluster events to provide this social opportunity, as well as ensuring the children pamper the special people in their lives. As always, the Sports Carnival was held in Term 4. All the children enjoyed participating in the running races, relays and traditional ball games. In the Staff/Parent relay and

games, the parents were the victors this year, winning 3 out of 3 events. It is always a friendly and fun competition.

Each year it is wonderful to see the Pre-Kindy and Sheddies children settling into their daily routines. The Pre-Kindy playground area was revamped with soft fall ground covering, creating a more useful space. The Pre-Kindy children also enjoyed going out on their first school excursion to a local park for a play. The Sheddies participated in many incursions from music to woodwork and went out on a variety of excursions including the Aviation Museum, Remida, Brownes Dairy and various local parks for plays and picnics.

The Outdoor Classroom excursions and the introduction of the Pre-Primary sleepover were the highlights of Pre-Primary in 2017. The Pre-Primaries enjoyed Outdoor Classroom excursions once a fortnight, providing the children with a variety of learning experiences from painting at City Beach, bush walking at Bold Park, beachcombing at Bathers Beach to getting stuck in the mud at the Secret Garden. The children were also lucky enough to visit the Police Air Wing and Brownes Dairy. We celebrated different cultures through cooking an Italian feast on Harmony Day, participating in an amazing Russian incursion and learning about different celebrations around the world. However, the most exciting event was the Pre-Primary sleepover. The children enjoyed preparing their dinner during the day, going out for an afternoon picnic then returning to school to watch a movie and sleep in their individual tepees. The children were fantastic!

In Year 1 the children settle into 'big school' routines and enjoy playing in the big playground during recess and lunch time with all the year groups. While Year 1 is traditionally known as the beginning of 'formal' school, our Year 1's incorporated the EYLF outcomes and ensure there are many play-based activities. The Year 1's engage in the local community with their Year Nine Hale School buddies. This involves the Hale students visiting the Year One classroom once a week and assisting their buddy during indoor and outdoor activities.

Throughout the year the year ones have also enjoyed many incursions and excursions including Caversham Wildlife Park, the State Library, Indigenous Program at Kings Park, tree planting at Mt Claremont and a Worm Farm Workshop. The children attend their first camp and for some children this is their first time away from home for two nights. Our Year 1 Camp was held at Woodman Point and the children have said that this was the highlight of the year. The purpose of our school camps is to develop the children's independence, resilience, confidence and friendships. They provide the children with an opportunity to build on their skills and personal development by challenging them with more adventurous activities.

While Year 2 becomes gradually more formal they still have many hands-on learning activities. Some of the highlights this year have been creating a recycled art piece at Remida, visiting the Shipwreck Museum for an olden day school experience and learning about fire safety with the visiting Perth



Fire Fighters. They also enjoyed participating in Martial Arts and Yoga. During Term 4 the class went to visit their pen pals that they wrote to throughout the year at John Wollaston Primary School. This is a wonderful opportunity for the development of the children's literacy and social skills through participating in a real life experience. With the experience of Year 1 Camp, the Year 2's are always excited and ready for action when they attend camp at Ern Halliday. The pirate game and kite making are some of their favourite activities on camp.

As a cluster, our goal is to send the children into Year 3 and beyond with confidence, enthusiasm, a solid understanding of the basic literacy and number skills and most importantly, a love of learning.



In 2017, the Upper Primary Cluster team was comprised of Anne Lavin (Yr 6), Susan Beilby and Rebecca Potts (Yr 5), Susan Wellington and Lisa Thomas (Yr 4). Year 3 joined the Upper Primary cluster this year with Jim O' Raw.

The team endeavours to meet every fortnight to discuss a variety of educational issues that impact teaching and learning in Years 3-6. The team discusses a variety of relevant topics which include; content and teaching strategies, curriculum, assessment and reporting, differentiating teaching to meet specific needs of students, Literacy and Numeracy strategies as well as specific focus areas within the curriculum and special concerns for individual students.

The Upper Primary Cluster work very much as a team; offering ongoing support to one another as well as professional reflection and vision for creating the best possible educational experiences for our students. The coordinators work closely together as well to help develop whole school initiatives that are appropriate across the whole school.

In Semester One, the team continued to work on the assessment data base, deciding on the best possible diagnostic assessments across Numeracy and Literacy to help teachers determine

individual student abilities as well as their needs at the commencement of the year. Prime Maths continued to be a focus area across the year groups as

it is still relatively new to the school. Through Lisa and Jim's hard work, STEM became more established and after school clubs were offered every term for Upper Primary students.

Once again, Upper Primary participated in the planting of seedlings at Claremont Lake and classes across Year 4-6 attended the Perth's Writer's Festival early in the year as part of their Literacy program. ECU Practice Students were placed in classes across the school with

four in Years 4. 5 and 6.

across the school participated in basic First Aid training as well as the Quintilian Sports Carnival.






Finance - Charles Herring - Bursar

The accounts for the year ended 31 December 2017, audited by Stielow Bell and Associates have been certified as shown in the extract from the Audit Report on the next page. A summary of key data contained in the financial statements has been extracted and is presented in tabular and graphical form showing comparisons with the prior year's result.

Quintilian School Financial Statements for the Year ended 31 December 2017



The budget was determined based on a break-even outcome and as can be seen there was a surplus of \$177,000, due to containment of costs together with above budget tuition fee and grant income. The number of students exceeded expectations with a final total of 230 students and the Federal Government unexpectedly agreed to extend the Universal Access Grant for Kindergarten.

As far as the Balance Sheet is concerned, current assets have increased by \$310,000, while non-current assets reduced by \$158,000 giving a net increase of \$152,000. The increase in cash reserves may enable reduction of the ANZ Loan/Overdraft facility, established in 2016 to assist with the Teaching/Administration Block renovation. After monitoring during first term of 2018, a decision will be made on repayment.
