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#### **Our Ethos**

- Quintilian is a community school where there is

   a direct partnership between the parents and teachers in the
   education of the children.
- At Quintilian we believe that children are individuals who require an approach that is child-centred and caters for a range of learning styles.
- A warm, caring environment is created where each child is valued and each child is known as an individual.
- The relationship between the teacher and the student is seen as vital if learning is to be maximised.
- The inherent desire to learn is fostered in the school so that all children feel they can be successful and learning can be fun and exciting.
- A holistic view of education underpins the school's approach and we encourage each child's development in the areas of academics, creativity, social skills, community responsibility, health and fitness.
- Real life experiences enhance the learning process and children need to go out and view the real world as much as possible.
- The development of self-discipline is valued over imposed discipline. The school has a philosophical expectation that children will behave appropriately, but will respond if this is not the case.
- Quintilian recognises and celebrates each child's successes and avoids directly comparing one child with another.

It's always exciting to celebrate a major anniversary. Quintilian's 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary provided a great opportunity to reflect on where we've come from and who we are. Quintilian was established in 1975 in Subiaco by a group of parents and educators who were seeking a small-scale community-oriented school which recognised that children have an innate curiosity and desire to learn. The school was named after the Roman educator, Marcus Fabius Quintilian (35–100 AD), who believed that the aim of education was to meet individual needs via the following three tenets

- Teachers should use different methods to suit the character and abilities of each pupil.
- Pupils should enjoy their studies and know the value of play and recreation.
- Pupils, if taught well, will instinctively regard their teacher with affection and respect.

The school enrolled 16 students in its first year and has now grown to well over 200. The school has evolved over this time, but continues to be underpinned by an emphasis on creativity and focus on educational outcomes. Quintilian has always been distinguished by its strong partnership between parents and teachers. Over the years we have also attracted a strong ex-pat community which has greatly added to our cultural diversity. Sadly, we have had to farewell some of these members of our community as they've moved back overseas with their work. This does however grow the Quintilian diaspora and our children are regularly connecting to friends across the globe either directly or online.

It is also important to recognise the core role of our teachers to whom we entrust our children and who are the custodians of Quintilian's ethos and values. Over the years that our family has been part of the Quintilian community, we have been so impressed with the extra effort that all of the staff put into making the school experience enjoyable and engaging for the children. So as I reflect back on our seven years at Quintilian I'll make an attempt to document what I have understood the Quintilian ethos to be. We are a school which strongly believes in child-centred education where each child is encouraged to be confidant, self-motivated and self-disciplined. Through this we seek to develop children who are tolerant, respect differences and have a lifelong love of learning.

This year we have given particular focus to raising the profile of Quintilian via a dedicated marketing strategy. A key initiative has been the development of our new logo which we hope captures a bit of the uniqueness of Quintilian. The starburst 'Q' signifies the diversity of our students, parents and staff. The different sizes of the rays symbolise the growth of our students as they pass through the school. As you will have seen, we have begun using this new logo on signage, stationary, T-shirts and advertising and social media.

#### NEIL COLLINS PRINCIPAL

I am excited to present my third annual report to the Quintilian School Community. The past year has flown past very quickly and it is only the fine support of Quintilian families and our excellent staff that has enabled us to achieve so much. During the year we were faced with the economic impact of the slowing local economy and particularly the resource industry affecting many of our families and our school. Sadly, many of our expat families were sent back overseas despite their love of WA and Quintilian School. I know many of them are very keen to return sometime in the future.

Across the school we continue to offer outstanding teaching and learning that caters for the wide variety of children in our care. The commitment and expertise our teaching and non-teaching staff offers to our students is simply superb.

Our teachers create stimulating, challenging and fun lessons where every child's needs are catered for. Our non-teaching staff are equally committed to our children. Our students continue to gain excellent results in NAPLAN and other external tests. These results are usually well in excess of State and National averages and many of our students are at the highest range of these standards.

The school continues to seek feedback from parents, teachers and students through a variety of means. This feedback and our strong enrolments confirm that the school community is highly satisfied with the educational program provided by the school.

This year we celebrated the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Quintilian School with two exceptionally well organised and well attended events. The 'Colour Run' for current and former students was a fun, exciting and very colourful afternoon. It was actually so successful that many parents suggested it should become an annual event. The enjoyment seen on the faces of all participants said much about the type of school we have. This event was followed a few weeks later by the Adult's 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Night which was attended by nearly 200 people. The setting of this event was absolutely amazing and I offer my sincere thanks to the organising committee for their tireless efforts over many months to ensure both 40<sup>th</sup> events were superb.

There were many other highlights throughout the year and these included the very popular Rottnest Family Weekend Camp, our welcome Sundowner BBQ, Mid-Week Munchies, Disco nights and the Early Learning Centre Gallery night.

Perhaps the greatest event and production for the year was "Wind in the Willows" where all our children from Pre-kindergarten to Year 6 took part in our bi-annual Whole School Production. The quality of the performers, their costumes, the music and the props were way in excess of what is normally considered the standard for a primary school performance. I have been told in no uncertain terms that I am not allowed to mention individual names, so I won't, but I do need to thank every single student, parent and staff member who in their own individual way contributed so much towards this outstanding performance event.

In 2016, we introduced the Singapore Maths teaching model into Years 1 - 6. OECD testing of students' performance in maths across the world has again placed Singapore's students in first place. We aim to have the majority of our students studying Year 6 and 7 concepts in Year 5 and Year 7 and 8 concepts in Year 6, with extension students touching on Year 9 concepts.

Last year we implemented coding/robotics into the curriculum for Years 4, 5 and 6, as well as offering an extra-curricular club. We were also fortunate to have received a \$3,000 grant from AISWA to assist us with new Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) and coding/robotics resources. In 2017 we will be increasing the opportunities for our younger students to take part in these activities.

The purchase of 30 iPads for use by all classes within the school and the upgrade of our Wi-Fi and internet service has created further learning opportunities for all of our students. It is vital that we maintain modern and relevant learning technologies for our students as they enter a very different and exciting future where many experts predict over 70% of future employment will be in STEM fields.

We are constantly reviewing the key areas of phonics, spelling, reading, writing and comprehension and a major outcome this year was our implementation of Jolly Phonics into Kindergarten and Pre-primary classes. The implementation of this program by our teachers has seen an immediate positive impact for all of our students. Jolly Phonics has a multi-sensory approach that enables all students to far more easily develop the required key literacy skills. Our teachers are committed to all of our students achieving at their highest possible literacy level and we will be introducing the Jolly Grammar approach into Years 1 -3 to continue the great success we have seen with Jolly Phonics.

I would like to thank all members of the Board for their many hours of tireless work in the governance of Quintilian School. We have a very professional Board with a wide range of skills who take their role very seriously and always act in the best interests of our school.

To our Board Chair, Bruce Hegge, special thanks for the support you provide me, you're wise counseling and for the extra hours you dedicate to our school.

# DIONNE SADDIK EARLY CHILDHOOD YEARS

Our Early Childhood years have a strong focus on developing a love for learning and wonderment about the world we live in, as well as explicitly teaching, learning and developing essential literacy and numeracy skills, concepts and understandings. This is all achieved, through a high quality play based curriculum. Intentional learning outcomes are planned for and embedded within a play context to ensure our students are engaged, challenged, stimulated and of course learning. This also provides the perfect context to support the children's developing social and emotional skills, fostering genuine and meaningful relationships between students and educators alike.

Like the other clusters the Early Childhood team meets on a fortnightly basis to collaborate and share ideas, as well as discuss pertinent curriculum issues. A strong focus for our cluster this year has been implementing the Jolly Phonics programme into our Sheddie and Pre-Primary classes. Our early years have always explicitly taught phonological awareness and phonics however, we have never followed a specific programme as such. Jolly Phonics is an evidence based, explicit programme. After doing a great deal of research, we felt it would fit in well with our teaching philosophy in the early years. This was a new and exciting journey for our cluster group and one that was met with resounding success for each and every child at their individual level. We now look forward to seeing how it translates going forward into next year.

The Sheddie and Pre-Primary classes always enjoy regular and varied incursions and excursions throughout the year including Spineless Wonders, Tamala Park Recycling Centre, Neville Collard incursion, Anya Brock city tour, Perth Hills Discovery Centre, The Worm Shed, Science Alive incursion, Lo Zucchero and a visit from Herdsman's Chef Dale, just to name a few. Our Pre-Kindy classes also enjoyed a very special excursion to AQWA, as well as several visits to the local park. As always all the year groups in our cluster enjoyed memorable Mother's Day and Father's Day functions, which were a great success. The end of the year culminated in the Pre-Kindy and Sheddie Learning Journey evening, which was a slight change from our usual Art Gallery. The idea of this event was to focus on and showcase the actual learning and processes that our children were involved in, as well as exhibiting their final artworks. The Learning Journey evening strongly supported our philosophy and was a wonderful way to share with families and friends some of the children's accomplishments from their year.

This year we have also continued and strengthened our Outdoor Classroom programme that was implemented in both Sheddies and Pre-Primary last year. Once again it has been an extremely beneficial part of our curriculum. The children have explored the flora and fauna of both local and further afield nature reserves including Bold Park, Trigg Beach, Herdsman Lake and Matilda Bay.

As always the Early Childhood team thanks our parent body for their ongoing support and active participation in their children's early education, helping to contribute towards a highly successful 2016.

# MEL RAYMENT MIDDLE PRIMARY YEARS

In Years 1-3 we focus on developing the children's independence, refining their social skills by broadening their relationships and extending their literacy and numeracy skills. The teaching team work collaboratively, meeting formally once a fortnight and casually when needed to ensure there is consistency across the year groups.

Although we follow the Western Australian and Australian curriculum, we always endeavour to programme play-based activities and real life experiences that will consolidate, extend and enhance the children's understanding of the learning areas. The classes regularly attend incursions, excursions and once a year a year group camp, which is always a highlight. In Year One the children attend their first camp, for some children this is their first time away from home. Our Year One camp was held at Woodman Point and Year Two at Ern Halliday. These camps are close to Perth and focus on developing the children independence, resilience, confidence and friendship. The Year 3 children camped at Fairbridge. This camp builds on their skills and personal development by challenging the children with more adventurous activities. The rock climbing and the 'Giant Swing' were the highlights of the camp.

As a cluster, our year groups came together for a team building and social skills workshop presented by Major Mitchell Productions. The children learnt about the importance of developing confidence and practiced some social skill techniques. We also celebrated the end of Semester One together, ice-skating at the Winter Wonderland in Fremantle. In Term Four the cluster came together for our annual sports carnival. As a cluster we offer the children the exposure to many different sports from badminton, AFL, netball to dance and Funky Fitness. The children learn protective behaviours during martial arts sessions with Renshi Glenn.

This year we introduced two cluster events, Mother's Day Gala and Father's Day Fun morning. This provided the opportunity for parents across the year groups to get to know each other, while participating in activities and craft with their child. Both mornings were very successful.

As a cluster our goal is to send the children into our upper school with confidence, enthusiasm and a solid understanding of the basic literacy and number skills.

# SUSAN WELLINGTON UPPER PRIMARY YEARS

In 2016, the Upper Primary Cluster team was comprised of Anne Lavin (Yr 6), Lisa Thomas, Susan Beilby (Yr 5), Jim O'Raw, Rebecca Potts and Susan Wellington (Yr 4).

The team meets once a fortnight to discuss a variety of educational issues that impact teaching and learning in Years 4-6. The team discusses a variety of relevant topics which include; content and teaching strategies, curriculum, assessment and reporting, differentiating teaching to meet specific needs of students, Literacy and Numeracy strategies as well as specific focus areas within the curriculum and special concerns for individual students. The Upper Primary Cluster work very much as a team; offering ongoing support to one another as well as professional reflection and vision for creating the best possible educational experiences for our students.

In Semester One, we focused on developing a record of diagnostic assessments through Upper Primary. This was used by all the teachers to record student assessment results on a common data base to help identify specific student needs to better develop relevant teaching strategies. Prime Maths was another focus area with all of the teachers participating in various Professional Development seminars relating to the Maths program. IT and Coding was another area of focus with Lisa and Jim also attending several Professional Development workshops on STEM related topics and programs. Jim successfully applied for a grant that resulted in Quintilian being the proud owners of a 3D printer.

Once again, the students in Upper Primary participated in the planting of seedlings at Claremont Lake as part of our Sustainability Program. The Yr 5s also attended the Perth's Writer's Festival earlier in the year as part of their Literacy program while the Yr 4s went out to visit the company that looks after Quintilian's waste (the Damien Cole Group). The experience led the school to revisit our policy of recycling paper waste in the classrooms and we are pleased to report that paper is once again being sorted and recycled at Quintilian as a whole school endeavour.

In Semester Two, the team focused on implementing the use of iPads in teaching and learning. The students across the three year groups took photos and made mini films using the new technology. They also used the many Apps available in both Numeracy and Literacy to enhance their more traditional learning experiences. The students of Upper Primary participated in; learning the basics of First Aid, the Quintilian Sports Carnival and the whole school production of Wind in the Willows. Students in Yrs 5 and 6 took on the main speaking parts while the Yr 3s and 4s sang in the choir.

It was a very busy 2016 and the events and activities mentioned above are but a few that comprised another fantastic year at Quintilian.




### CHARLES HERRING BURSAR

The accounts for the year ended 31 December 2016 were audited by Stielow Bell and Associates and certified as shown in the extract from the Audit Report on the next page. 

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The budget was determined on the basis of a break even outcome and as can be seen there was a small deficit of \$31,000, less than 1% of total costs. There was a sharp decline in the number of students due to the current economic climate, which could have led to serious financial difficulties, but key decisions were taken to contain costs to offset the lower than anticipated income from tuition fees and government grants.

As far as the Balance Sheet is concerned, current assets declined by \$419,000, while non-current assets increased by \$512,000 giving a net increase of \$93,000. The shift between current and non-current reflects the capital expenditure on the refurbishment of the teaching/administration building, financed primarily from cash reserves. Liabilities increased by \$116,000 which reflects the part funding of the teaching/administration building refurbishment. The net movement in net assets was accordingly just \$23,000.
